Past	Gone by in time and no longer existing.
Present	The period of time now occurring.
Victoria Era	In the history of the United Kingdom and the British Empire, the Victorian era was the period of Queen Victoria's reign, from 20 June 1837 until her death on 22 January 1901.
Seaside	A place by the sea, especially a beach area or holiday resort.
Holiday	An extended period of leisure and recreation, especially one spent away from home or in travelling.
Entertainment	The action of providing or being provided with amusement or enjoyment.
Beach	A strip of land covered with sand, shingle, or small stones at the edge of a body of water, especially by the sea between high- and low-water marks.
Pier	A platform on pillars projecting from the shore into the sea, typically incorporating entertainment arcades and places to eat.
Promenade	A paved public walk, typically one along the seafront at a resort.
Bathing machine	A wheeled hut drawn to the edge of the sea, used for changing in and bathing from.
